Message from Phe

From the Rectory



I will say of the LORD, "He is my refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust." ...A thousand may fall at your side, ten thousand at your right hand, but it will not come near you. Psalm 91

Every November we commemorate the end of the First World War and remember those whose lives were affected by it and other wars since. Every year we do this on Armistice Day, 11th November and in churches the closest Sunday to 11th. In 2022 remembrance Sunday will be on 13th November. The world had not seen a war like the First World War, 65 million men were mobilised across Europe. Nearly a third of them – some 21 million – were wounded and another 8.5 million were killed, with 7.7 million taken prisoners of war. All of them had family and friends whose lives were changed forever by the events of 1914-1918. I would hazard a guess that all of us have a story to tell of at least 1 member of our distant family who was affected by that war.

One lady, Grace Cross, from nearby Leatherhead, Surrey, tells a fascinating story about her grandad, Pte Frank Viner. Frank was 21 when he joined the army and found himself in some of the worst fighting at the Somme, France. Grace says that her grandad was a jovial, thoughtful and happy person who was always willing to help others. Just three before he joined up, his father had given Frank a Bible for his birthday. Frank always kept the Bible in his right-hand pocket but for some reason, whilst he was in the trenches at the Somme, he moved the bible to his left-hand pocket. He remembered the words *'A thousand may fall at your side, ten thousand at your right hand, but it will not come near you.'*

Psalm 91

Just as he remembered these words there was an enormous blast as a shell hit the trench he was in. All his comrades around him were killed. Frank was thrown to the ground by the shell's impact, his uniform was torn, and his helmet blown off. Frank would have been dead if it had not been for his Bible. A huge piece of shrapnel was embedded in the bible ripping it open from cover-to-cover. 'If Frank hadn't moved the bible to his left pocket, he would have been killed,' said Grace. Frank always said to Grace that his bible saved his life, believing that God was protecting him.

Frank being protected and saved didn't mean that he was totally unscathed. Frank suffered shellshock and was admitted to hospital. What then followed was years of mental health problems resulting in two nervous breakdowns. But Frank never lost his faith in God, and he always went to church, twice, each Sunday! Frank did go to Bible college and considered going into full time ministry, instead he worked fulltime in his family's bakery business and fulfilled his calling as a Lay Preacher, ensuring people knew the redemptive power of God.

There are countless stories of bravery, survival and hope just like Frank's. What touched me by this story is the reality of Frank's ordeal, that 'yes', he survived but he was scarred for the rest of his life, and I'm sure those scars had an impact on his family too. Frank's story reminds us that bad, horrible and tragic things do happen and none of us are immune to them, and some people live with those scars for a lifetime. Yet in the dark, unforgiving hole of the trench, Frank heard the voice of God and trusted in those words, then and for the rest of his life.

As we remember the men, women and children who have lived through WW1, WW2 and others war since, let us also stop for a moment and listen. Whatever dark place we may find ourselves in, there will be a glimmer of light that shines through giving us a window of hope where God is trying to speak into our situation. What is God saying to you? How do you respond?





Some confusion seems to have arisen regarding the arrangements for visitors to St Mary's, and I have been invited to provide some clarification.

Guided tours can be organised at any time of year by prior arrangement with the Parish Office, provided the church is available on the chosen date and a Church Guide is on hand to lead the tour. No charge is made, although donations to St Mary's are welcome. In recent years, our tour groups have included Probus groups, heraldry groups and a party of Americans on a tour of locations associated with the soldier and statesman, William Marshal.

In addition, the church is open to visitors on a regular basis on Saturdays, Sundays and Bank Holidays from April to October between 2pm and 4pm, except when the church is in use for, say, a wedding. A Church Guide is always in attendance at these times to welcome visitors and to answer questions.

Sir William Croyser

With the lying-in-state of the late Queen Elizabeth in Westminster Great Hall still fresh in our minds, it is interesting to know that some of the timbers used in the magnificent roof of the building came from royal woods in Hampshire, Hertfordshire, and the park of Sir William Croyser of Stoke D'Abernon who supplied over six hundred oaks in 1395.

Sir William had married Elizabeth the daughter of William D'Abernon, and so became the Lord of the Manor and, we assume, lived in the Manor House.

The heraldic crests Croyser/D'Abernon and Norbury/Croyser can be seen in two of the windows of the Norbury Chapel as well as elsewhere in the church.

Choral Eucharist at St Mary's

Choral Eucharist: Sunday 6th November

The setting for the Choral Eucharist on 6TH November is the 'Missa Princeps Pacis' (Mass of the Prince of Peace) by William Lloyd Webber 1914-1982.

A pupil of Vaughan Williams at the Royal College of Music he later returned to the college as a teacher of composition before being appointed Principal of the London College of Music.

For many years William was organist of the Methodist Central Hall, Westminster. His two sons Andrew the composer and entrepreneur and Julian the cellist, fly the family's musical flag today.

The communion anthem is 'Lord for thy tender mercy's sake' is variously contributed to composers Richard Farrant 1525-1580 and John Hilton the younger 1599-1657. This anthem is sung, by tradition, at the annual Royal Maundy Service. Farrant was organist of Queen Elizabeth I Chapel Royal and St. George's Chapel, Windsor. He was co-founder of the Blackfriars Theatre where the choristers of the Chapel Royal took part in many staged productions. Hilton was organist of St. Margaret's Church, Westminster, and a Lutenist to King Charles I. He composed many songs, published in several volumes during his lifetime.

After the tours, we move to the Chapel Royal for a joint concert by both choirs, at 6:00, to include music celebrating St. Cecilia.

The evening will conclude with a reception in the spectacular King’s Guard Chamber, with canapés and Chilworth Manor sparkling wine from the Surrey Hills. Members of the Establishments of the Chapel Royal, Christ Church and Historic Royal Palaces will be hosting you during the reception.

Yehudi Menuhin School

At our St Mary's November Concert we will be entertained by the talented pupils of the Yehudi Menuhin School but most of us know very little about the school.

The concerts given by the pupils of the Yehudi Menuhin School are always extremely popular, and we are so lucky to have the school and the Menuhin Hall as our near neighbour. There are now 80 pupils at the school from all corners of the world. Alumni include Nicola Benedetti, Nigel Kennedy and Alina Ibragimova.

The 300-seat concert hall provides rehearsal, recording and performance space for the pupils, who give in the region of 20 public Showcase concerts there each year. The Hall also presents a guest artist series for musicians of international renown, offering an alternative to traveling to London for top-quality classical concerts. Local arts groups also regularly hire the auditorium for lectures and concerts.

Many of our parishioners are aware of the school and indeed are Friends of the Yehudi Menuhin. Menuhin himself founded the Friends in the early '70s with the help of a few dedicated, local supporters. Since then, the Friends have grown to over 750 people from all over the globe, offering financial assistance to the School and a warm, enthusiastic presence at concerts. Many Friends have followed the careers of the pupils throughout their time at the school, and out into the wider world where they have become soloists, conductors, composers, teachers and ensemble players. Becoming a Friend enables priority booking at concerts, invitations to some free events and involvement in the school.

As with many things at present the school is under increased financial pressure. Pupils are admitted based on talent and potential and more than 90% need financial assistance to attend the school. The school needs support and is very keen to grow the Friends membership.

Stoke D'Abernon Memorial Park

With this being the season of Remembrance it seems opportune to include a feature regarding the renovation and rededication of the Stoke D'Abernon Memorial Park, which is opposite The Old Plough Public House in Station Road. We are grateful to Ian Nelson for permission to reproduce his article written for the Heritage Trust Newsletter.

In early 2021, David Cooke, Secretary and Archivist of CCHT, discovered during his research, that the popular children's playground, opposite the Old Plough in Stoke D'Abernon, was registered on the Imperial War Museum website as a war memorial...

This was news to everyone and was met with a mixture of surprise and embarrassment, as the community was blissfully unaware of this war memorial site on our doorstep.

It emerged that in 1946 the Women's Institute had planted eleven cherry trees: each tree to commemorate a local service man or woman who had given their life in service of their country during World War 2, and those names are shown on stone memorials on the Tilt and in St Mary's churchyard.

Since then some of the trees had died, the site had been equipped as a children's playground, and the original planting forgotten.

A successful application was made to the Elmbridge CIL Fund, and the Stoke D'Abernon's Residents Association, supported by Cobham Heritage Trust and Elmbridge Green Spaces team, commenced restoring and reviving the site. Five new trees of assorted species were planted to complement the remaining six surviving trees, and to create a 'grove' rather than a formal 'avenue'. Old tree stumps and dead tree branches were removed, and a wild play area was created. Two new benches were also acquired and a stylish new 'explanatory board' designed and installed.

On 27th September 2022, a dedication ceremony was held at the park with a formal renaming of the site as 'Stoke D'Abernon Memorial Park'. This was conducted by Rev Phe as one of her first tasks in her new parish.

In attendance was the Mayor of Elmbridge—Cllr Simon Waugh, Dominic Raab MP, Councillors and the Royal British Legion. After the ceremony the Old Plough served coffee and the WI provided plenty of delicious cakes.

We hope visitors will enjoy their visits to the new Memorial park and take time to remember the residents of Stoke D’Abernon who gave their lives for our country.

One recent Sunday afternoon, while browsing the internet my attention was drawn to some photographs of the most amazing needlework I had ever seen. Not only were the pieces detailed but they were VAST in size. On reading more I discovered that this exhibition was on show at Guildford Cathedral. I was lucky enough to get the opportunity to visit it. Guildford Cathedral lends itself well to large exhibitions because of its simplistic design, good lighting and size which allows the viewer to stand back and admire the exhibits clearly.

The Exhibition ***Threads through Creation*** was inspired by the first pages of the book of Genesis. It was completed in 2021 and took nearly three years of work—although you would be forgiven for thinking it would have taken at least double that time! It comprises twelve huge panels.

Unfortunately the exhibition is no longer available to view at Guildford but you can visit Jacqui's website to see where the exhibition will be visiting during the remainder of 2022, 2023 and the first half of 2024. If you get the opportunity I thoroughly recommend it.




Day 2—Water—The creator continues his work—the second large space created with sky above and water below

Loving God,

This is intended to serve as a reminder to us all about our shared responsibilities to keep each other, our local and our wider community safe from neglect, abuse and trauma in whatever ways we can. People from all walks of life, all social backgrounds, all income levels, all ethnicities, all ages can be victims of neglect and abuse. We can never assume that people we know and care about are not experiencing harm at the hands of a trusted person, or at the hands of a stranger – we are all required to be vigilant to protect those too vulnerable to protect themselves. In most cases our people around us are safe, healthy, happy and thriving but for some this is not the case, and it is for those people that we must be forever aware, attentive and willing to intervene.
